

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FUSE Administration Mid-Year Report


The FUSE Administration Mid-Year Report provides an in-depth overview of the achievements and ongoing initiatives of the Indiana University Student Government (IUSG) under the leadership of Student Body President Cooper Tinsley and Student Body Vice President Nicole Santiuste. Since the FUSE administration took office on April 25, 2024, it has focused on fostering a sense of belonging, unifying the campus, and empowering and supporting students. With a mission to build bridges and break barriers, the administration has worked diligently to fulfill campaign promises while addressing the evolving needs of the IU student body. This report highlights key progress made across various initiatives, showcasing a commitment to resilience, inclusion, and the creation of a thriving university environment.





Student Body Survey Report Fall 2024

The FUSE administration conducted the Student Body Fall Survey to gather critical insights into IU Bloomington students' experiences, concerns, and priorities. Developed by the Office of Data and Research, the survey was designed to reach students across all programs, years, and learning modalities. Shared through email, campus efforts, and social media, it reached a wide audience, providing invaluable insight into the student experience. The results from this survey will continue to help shape advocacy efforts, initiatives, and policy recommendations that reflect what matters most to students. This report below highlights those findings and underscores the FUSE administration's commitment to amplifying student voices to shape the future of IU.

Bring Back the Bison

Since the retirement of the bison mascot in 1969, IU Bloomington has lacked an official mascot or a central symbol beyond the IU trident and the Hoosier identity. The FUSE Administration is leading the charge in addressing this long-standing void by advocating for the return of the bison, a mascot deeply rooted in IU's history, heritage, and traditions. This initiative has garnered overwhelming support, with a recent student poll showing that 72% of respondents favor bringing back the bison. The excitement surrounding this effort builds on the unity fostered during the 2024 football season, which brought students together to celebrate a high-winning record.

Student Body President Cooper Tinsley is working closely with IU Athletics and other stakeholders to seamlessly reintegrate the bison as a lasting emblem of IU's identity. This initiative seeks to elevate school spirit, enrich

campus traditions, and enhance IU's branding as a vibrant and united institution. The advocacy from the FUSE administration revives a cherished tradition and underscores the importance of shared symbols in fostering connection and belonging. The bison will represent Indiana University's

excellence, resilience, and a sense of community for current and future generations. We invite the entire IU community to join us in celebrating this historic milestone as we embark on a new chapter of shared pride.

First-Year Internship Program

This year, 21 first-year students joined the program, setting a new standard for engagement and inclusivity. FIP, a cornerstone of IUSG, is designed to empower first-year students by providing them with hands-on opportunities to work on impactful initiatives, develop leadership skills, and gain meaningful experience. Each intern is paired with an Executive Branch member, creating a mentorship dynamic that helps them implement projects and contribute to transformative changes across campus. As part of the program, participants engage in an eight-week, one-credit course to enhance their leadership skills and deepen their understanding of IUSG. The course concluded with impressive presentations from the interns, highlighting their individual projects and application of the course material. Their hard work and creativity set a high standard for leadership and innovation. We are excited to continue working with these talented interns in the upcoming semester and look forward to seeing their continued growth and contributions!

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






If you witness or experience a bias incident, your voice matters. Follow the steps to report it and help create a safer, more inclusive community. Together, we can stand against discrimination and support one another.

CONGRESS ENROLLED ACT No. 1002

Be it enacted by the students of Indiana University in Congress assembled:

On December 2, 2024, Congress passed Bill No. 1002, authored by Representative Elizabeth Conley, which **encourages transportation to religious venues.**

- Support the efforts to provide consistent and reliable public transportation to religious venues.
- Encourages The Indiana University Transportation Group to ensure that public transportation routes extend regular stops at or near religious centers on campus.
- The university transportation committee would update all transportation maps, mobile apps, and websites to highlight the routes and stops that serve as religious centers on campus.

Regular Session of the 2024-2025 IU Student Body Congress

CONGRESS ENROLLED ACT No. 1011

Be it enacted by the students of Indiana University in Congress assembled:

On December 9, 2024, Congress passed Bill No. 1011, authored by Representative Eric Cannon, which tasks the Office of the Student Body President to work in partnership with university administration to establish take-out food options at Forest Dining Hall. The bill urges a focus on improving dining accessibility and convenience for students across campus. Key findings include the Forest Dining Hall's high usage, students' lack of time to dine in, and existing partial use of disposable utensils. The bill emphasizes:

- Prioritizing breakfast take-out options to accommodate morning schedules.
- Maintaining sit-down dining to uphold Forest's mission.
- Exploring practical take-out container systems.
- Ensuring healthy options, leveraging the existing salad and fruit bar.

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Regular Session of the 2024-2025 IU Student Body Congress

CONGRESS ENROLLED ACT No. 1013

Be it enacted by the students of Indiana University in Congress assembled:

On December 16, 2024, Congress passed Bill No. 1013, authored by Representatives Ryan Gray and Eric Cannon, which advocates for Indiana University Bloomington to Bring Back the Bison.

- Congress reaffirms its recognition and adoption of the Bison as the official mascot of Indiana University Bloomington as established in 1965.
- Reinstating the Bison mascot as a tangible symbol would enhance the sense of pride and unity among students, faculty, alumni, and other supporters of IU athletics.

CONGRESS ENROLLED ACT No. 1014

Be it enacted by the students of Indiana University in Congress assembled:

On December 16, 2024, Congress passed Bill No. 1014, authored by Representatives Maddi Sponsel, Leo Cavinder and Eric Cannon, which **supports the Indiana Daily Student.**

- The Office of the Student Body President is tasked with working with IU administration to find sustainable ways to maintain the weekly print edition of the IDS.
- Encourages The Committee for Fee Review (CFR) should heavily consider funding the IDS in recognition that it serves the entire student body.
- Urges the IDS to work with Indiana University Student Government to identify ways in which to further engage the study body.


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



INTERNATIONAL DAY OF PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES

International Day of Persons with Disabilities (IDPD) is observed annually on December 3rd to promote the rights and well-being of individuals with disabilities across the globe. The day was first established by the United Nations General Assembly in 1992, with the goal of fostering an understanding of disability issues and advocating for the inclusion of persons with disabilities in all aspects of political, social, economic, and cultural life. Each year, the United Nations selects a specific theme to focus attention on various aspects of disability, and to emphasize the importance of creating a more accessible, inclusive world for all. This year's theme is "Amplifying the leadership of persons with disabilities for an inclusive and sustainable future". In the FUSE administration, we are deeply committed to supporting the purpose of IDPD by fostering an environment that values diversity, amplifies the voices of people with disabilities, and actively works to remove barriers to inclusion. Through our initiatives, we aim to raise awareness, celebrate contributions, and take meaningful actions to create a more inclusive and supportive community for all.

CHRISTMAS

Christmas is a holiday of joy and reflection, marking the birth of Jesus Christ, whom Christians revere as the Son of God. While the exact date of his birth remains unknown, December 25 has become the traditional day for Christians to honor this sacred event, with Orthodox Christians celebrating on or near January 7. Originating during the darkest days of winter, Christmas traditions have long symbolized bringing warmth and brightness into the world. The decorating of Christmas trees, originating from ancient European customs, serves as a centerpiece of homes, adorned with lights and ornaments symbolizing life and beauty. The exchange of gifts reflects the generosity of the Three Wise Men, who brought gifts to the newborn Jesus, while festive meals bring loved ones together in gratitude and celebration. Santa Claus, inspired by Saint Nicholas, embodies the spirit of goodwill, delighting children and adults alike. **The FUSE administration wishes a Merry Christmas to all who celebrate!** May your season be filled with peace, love, and warmth.



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HANUKKAH

Hanukkah, also known as Chanukah, is an eight-day Jewish celebration that commemorates the rededication of the Second Temple in Jerusalem during the second century BCE. The holiday begins on the 25th of Kislev on the Hebrew calendar and honors the miracle of the menorah, when a small vial of oil, expected to last one day, burned for eight days. This is why the lighting of the nine-branched menorah, called the Hanukkiah, is at the heart of the celebration. Each night, one additional candle is lit after sundown, using the shamash, or "helper" candle, until all eight are illuminated. Blessings accompany this ritual and serve as a reminder of the miracle that inspired the holiday. Hanukkah is also a time for joyful traditions, including sharing festive foods and exchanging gifts. Known as the Festival of Lights, it embodies themes of resilience, dedication, and the enduring power of faith. The FUSE administration wishes a Happy Hanukkah and Chag Sameach to all who celebrate! May this season of light bring joy, peace, and unity.

KWANZAA

Kwanzaa, created in 1966 by Dr. Maulana Karenga during the civil rights movement, is inspired by traditional African first-fruit harvest festivals. It reflects themes of community, culture, and self-determination. Observed from December 26 to January 1, the holiday is centered around the Nguzo Saba, or Seven Principles: Umoja (Unity), Kujichagulia (Self-Determination), Ujima (Collective Work and Responsibility), Ujamaa (Cooperative Economics), Nia (Purpose), Kuumba (Creativity), and Imani (Faith). Each evening, a candle is lit on the Kinara, a seven-branched candelabra, with each candle representing one of the principles. This ritual is accompanied by music, storytelling, and reflections, deepening the meaning of the celebration. Kwanzaa is also marked by exchanging handmade gifts, traditional African foods, and fostering a stronger connection to cultural heritage, identity, and resilience. The FUSE administration wishes a joyous Kwanzaa to all who celebrate! May the light of the Kinara inspire hope, unity, and creativity in the year ahead.
