

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### The Student Body Congress votes on the initial draft of the Expressive Activity Policy

The Student Body Congress is the legislative branch of IUSG comprised of student representatives who serve on behalf of academic, residential, or multicultural constituencies. On July 8, 2024, for the **initial draft** of the Expressive Activity Policy, Congress voted on subsections 1-9 of the policy statement and the policy as a whole. In addition to the survey responses and discussions with student governance groups, their inputs provided valuable insights into the overall sentiment toward the policy and highlighted key areas that need attention and improvement.

Dear IU Bloomington Students,

Today, the IU Board of Trustees approved the new <u>Expressive Activity Policy (UA-10)</u>, a decision that will significantly impact every student on our campus. While we are grateful to have had the opportunity to provide feedback on behalf of the student body, we must acknowledge that this policy still harbors several critical flaws. After a review of over 200 pages of responses from various stakeholders, the Office of the Vice President and General Counsel has implemented several key improvements to the policy, including those presented by the Student Body President:

- 1. **Restrictions on Camping:** In the previous version, no form of camping was allowed at all. However, the revised policy allows for the approval of such activities so long as they are part of an official University event.
- 2. **Definition of Expressive Activity:** The policy now clearly defines protected expressive activities, including participating in speech or conduct protected by the First Amendment, communicating by any lawful means, participating in peaceful assembly, protesting, making speeches, distributing literature, carrying signs, and circulating petitions.
- 3. **Clarification of Disruptions:** The term "materially and substantially disrupt" has been clarified to align with <u>UA-14 (The First Amendment at Indiana University)</u>, ensuring that protected conduct includes lawful protesting in public areas of campus and minor, brief, nonviolent disruptions.
- 4. Addition of a Content-Neutral Clause: Time, place, and manner regulations must be content and viewpoint-neutral, allowing IU community members to assemble spontaneously and contemporaneously.
- 5. **Sanctions Adjustment:** The language now states that conduct believed to violate the policy *may* result in immediate action, including citation, trespass, and/or *interim* suspension, rather than automatic severe penalties.

Despite these revisions and further recommendations by the Student Body President, the policy remains deeply flawed and presents significant concerns:

- 6. Use of Force: The policy allows the Associate Vice President/Superintendent for Public Safety to engage additional resources to remove unapproved structures, potentially inviting the use of force against students. Let us be unequivocally clear: IUSG has never and will never support a policy that encourages the use of physical force against students.
- 7. **Appeal Process:** The final policy fails to assert the right to appeal sanctions for students, faculty, and staff, which was present in the first draft. The right to appeal, guaranteed under

the student code of conduct, is a fundamental protection that must be upheld for students and extended to other constituencies.

- 7. **Time Restrictions:** Expressive activity is still prohibited outside the hours of 6:00 a.m. and 11:00 p.m., limiting freedom of expression despite existing clauses addressing disruptions. The First Amendment does not cease to protect free speech and expressive activities after 11:00 p.m. The right to free speech is a fundamental liberty that must be upheld at all hours.
- 8. Advance Notice for Structures: The requirement for a 10-day advance request for temporary structures conflicts with the need for spontaneous and contemporaneous expressive activities. This restriction undermines students' ability to promptly respond to current events and exercise their right to immediate expression in reaction to unfolding situations.
- 9. Lack of Stakeholder Involvement: The policy lacks mechanisms for student, faculty, and staff involvement in decisions related to approvals or denials of applications or appeals, including temporary structures and camping.

We thank Trustee Seibert for his advocacy and Trustee Winston for her steadfast support of the student body. As we approach the fall semester, **let us stand unified in our determination to safeguard our rights and freedoms.** We have the power to shape our campus environment, and through our collective voice, we will continue to advocate for policies that reflect our values and protect our rights. Rest assured, this is not the end. IUSG will continue to push for revisions to this policy to better serve the student body. 


## Student Feedback on the <u>Initial Draft</u> of the Expressive Activity Policy


After reading the proposed policy, how well do you feel you understand its content?




Generally speaking, do you believe this policy to be neutral?




Regulation 3 states that "the request for temporary structures must be requested 10 days in advance of proposed installation." Do you believe this timeline to be suitable for expressive activity?




Do you believe this timeline to be too far in advance or not far enough?




Regulation 4 states that "Non-water soluble, semi-permanent, and permanent substances: These items, including, but not limited to, spray chalk, are not permitted on any University surface, including vertical surfaces, lampposts, signs, public art, and sculptures. No markings of any kind are permitted on vertical surfaces." Do you believe that using mediums such as spray chalk and paint is a form of expressive activity?




Regulation 5 states that "Overnight camping, which includes the use of any item to create a shelter, is not a form of Expressive Activity," and that "Encampments and overnight Expressive Activity are not permitted in any indoor or outdoor location." Do you believe overnight camping/encampments are a form of expressive activity?




Regulation 6 states that "Expressive Activity may not block ingress or egress to any building...and must take place a minimum of twenty-five feet...from the entrance to any University building. Expressive Activity shall not impede or interfere with vehicular or pedestrian traffic." Do you believe that presence in such areas, provided they are public spaces, is a form of expressive activity?






Do you believe that the proposed policy is more or less protective of your rights to freedom of expression relative to the previous policy <u>BL-ACA-I18</u>?

Introducing IU Student Government's

New Seal!



The IUSG seal serves as the organization's most formal mark. Though not intended for everyday use, the seal's elements encapsulate the history and mission of IUSG. The balanced scale signifies **fairness, justice, and equality**. An open book, inscribed with the year 1912, commemorates the first mention of a student council at Indiana University on **December 5, 1912**. Surrounding the central imagery is the Latin phrase "Custodire Lus Studiosum," meaning "**Protect Student Rights**." The torch, placed before the book and scales, references our state flag. Finally, the outer ring features the Latin words "Indianensis Universitatis Imperium Discipulus," translating to "Indiana University Student Government."

#### A PROCLAMATION ON RECOGNIZING DECEMBER 5, 1912, AS THE FOUNDING DAY OF THE INDIANA UNIVERSITY STUDENT GOVERNMENT BY THE STUDENT BODY PRESIDENT OF INDIANA UNIVERSITY A PROCLAMATION

Recognizing the essential role of student governance in fostering leadership, advocacy, and community at Indiana University, it is imperative that we honor the origins and historical milestones that have shaped the Indiana University Student Government.

**Whereas**, the concept of a student council at Indiana University was first proposed on December 5, 1912, during a meeting of what is now called the Indiana Memorial Union Board, when Professor Louis S. Davis presented the plan to establish a council dedicated to student welfare and self-governance following a faculty resolution aimed at reconciling faculty and student viewpoints, and it was during this meeting that the idea of student self-government at Indiana University was first approved by students.

**Whereas**, the student council, as outlined, was intended to bridge the gap between faculty and students, representing a significant step toward a comprehensive system of student self-government and emphasizing representation based on individual merit;

**Whereas**, despite initial enthusiasm and support, the early efforts of the student council faced numerous challenges, including jurisdictional overlaps with other campus organizations and a significant defeat in the 1919 referendum, delaying the establishment of a stable student government;

**Whereas**, persistent advocacy by student leaders and support from university administration, especially from IU President Herman B Wells, culminated in the ratification of a student government constitution on January 28, 1944, thus laying the foundation for the current IUSG;

**Whereas**, the IUSG has evolved significantly since its inception, adapting to the changing needs of the student body and expanding its responsibilities to enhance student life at Indiana University;

**Now, Therefore**, I, Cooper Tinsley, Student Body President of Indiana University, by virtue of the authority vested in me, do hereby proclaim December 5, 1912, as the Founding Day of the Indiana University Student Government.

To commemorate this recognition, I hereby adopt a new seal for the Indiana University Student Government, affixed to the document embodying this proclamation. This seal will serve as a symbol of our legacy and will be used exclusively by senior IUSG officials on official documents, in addition to our current symbol.

I further assign the Department of General Operations, under the direction of the Executive Chief of Staff, the responsibility of developing comprehensive branding guidelines for the use of the seal. Additionally, the recognition and celebration of Founding Day will be coordinated by the Office of Alumni Relations to ensure that this important milestone is honored annually within our community.

In Witness Whereof, I have hereunto set my hand this twelfth day of July, in the present year two thousand and twenty-four, and of the Indiana University Student Government the one-hundred and twelfth.



# **FUN FUN JULY** FACTS

- On July 17, 1898, Frances Marshall Eagleson was born. Eagleson would go on to become the first Black woman to graduate from Indiana University. In 1969, The Neal-Marshall Black Culture Center at IU Bloomington was named in honor of Eagleson and Marcellus Neal (the first Black man to graduate from IU).
- On July 26, 2005, the Indiana University Office of Sustainability was created to promote environmental stewardship and sustainability initiatives on campus.
- In July 2007, the Indiana University Division of Labor Studies merged with the School of Social Work.
- On July 1, 2014, Indiana University established the Media School, which combines the 100-year-old journalism program, the telecommunications department, and portions of the communication and culture department.





# DISABILITY PRIDE MONTH

Disability Pride Month began in July 1990, coinciding with the anniversary of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) being signed into law. This landmark legislation marked a crucial step in ensuring rights and protections for individuals with disabilities, promoting accessibility, and prohibiting workplace discrimination. This month is dedicated to recognizing both visible and invisible disabilities while honoring the diverse experiences and contributions of individuals with disabilities.
