### **Survey Overview and Data Collection**

#### **Survey Overview**

This survey was developed by the Indiana University Student Government's Office of Data and Research to gather student opinions and insights relevant to ongoing initiatives. It was designed to reach all students at IU Bloomington, regardless of their program, year, or learning modality. For the purposes of this report, references to "students" pertain exclusively to those enrolled at IU Bloomington. The survey was primarily distributed through a mass email sent to every IU Bloomington student via their university email account. To increase awareness, additional promotions included posters and social media posts highlighting the survey and the email link. To encourage participation, respondents were entered into a drawing for an IU-themed gift basket. The majority of responses were received within the first 24 hours of the survey's launch.

#### **Note on Responsible Data Usage**

It is important that no conclusions reached in this report be considered a definitive fact. All data presented should be regarded as a suggestion towards fact rather than a definitive conclusion. These conclusions are useful but must be understood within the context of existing knowledge.

Statistics should be used in accordance with the context in which they were collected. As an example, in baseball, stats are perfect representations of a player's performance. When calculating batting averages, the outcome of every single at-bat is known and accounted for. If a player has a .300 average, there is a 100% certainty that this player got a hit 30% of the time. Survey data is different. While baseball statistics operate in a perfect and transparent information environment, the accuracy of survey data is diluted by many factors.


Due to the inherent uncertainty of survey data, it should be considered an approximation rather than completely accurate. The data in this report can only be accurate when used within the context of this uncertainty. While there is a clear difference between a .290 and .300 batting average, no such distinction should be drawn between a survey result of 29% and 30%.

#### Standard Deviation of Mean

Standard deviation of the mean is a measure of variability that indicates how much the individual responses in the sample differ from the average (mean). In this report, it helps to understand the dispersion of hourly wages among the sample of students. A smaller standard deviation implies that most responses are clustered around the mean, whereas a larger standard deviation suggests more variability in the reported wages.

#### **Confidence Intervals**

Confidence intervals are used throughout this report to account for the fact that we cannot obtain comprehensive responses from the entire student body. In this report, a certainty of 95% is used, which is the most common. Simply put, there is a 95% chance that the overall population's value is within the interval.



See Example 1. The value found in the surveyed population is 4.3. As indicated by the grey confidence interval, there is a 95% certainty that the value representing the total population is between 4.2 and 4.4. It should also be noted that confidence intervals are subject to externalities in the same way any other data is, so confidence intervals will be unreliable when dealing with data that has not been adjusted for improperly represented populations.

### **Response Demographics, Personal Identities**

### Q: What is your gender identity?

The survey results indicate that cisgender and transgender females make up the largest group of respondents at 63.3%, followed by cisgender and transgender males at 26%. Individuals with other gender identities account for approximately 4.4% of the responses.

#### Q: What is your ethnic background?

The survey results indicate that White/Caucasian students are the majority at 70.6%, followed by Asian students at 14.5% and Latino/Hispanic students at 6.8%. Native American/Indigenous and Pacific Islander students are notably underrepresented, comprising less than 2% combined. This distribution closely reflects the university's demographic makeup.

### **Response Demographics, Student Identities**

#### Q: What is your class standing?

The survey results indicate that graduate students represent the largest proportion of respondents at 26%, followed closely by freshmen at 23.3%.

The survey results indicate that in-state students constitute the majority at 58.3%, followed by out-of-state students at 31.7%, and international students at 10%. This distribution aligns closely with the overall student body composition at Indiana University, where in-state students are 55.7% of total population.

These findings align well with IU Transportation Demand's 2023 Survey, which reports that 35.8% of students were living on campus or in Greek Housing and 64.2% of students were living off-campus or in other housing situations. The survey results indicate that 2.7% of respondents selected "Other (Not in Bloomington)" as their housing type. This category likely includes students who are enrolled in fully online programs and do not reside in Bloomington, as well as those temporarily living elsewhere due to internships, co-op programs, or study abroad opportunities. It may also encompass students commuting from outside Bloomington.

The tables above summarize hourly wages reported by students at their last job before coming to campus. The data is segmented by student type and residency, offering insights into wage distribution across different groups. All students' overall mean hourly wage was \$16.70, and the median was \$15.00. Undergraduate students, who made up the majority of respondents, had slightly lower average earnings, with a mean wage of \$15.50. Among this group, in-state students reported the lowest wages, with a mean of \$14.30 and a median of \$14.00. In contrast, out-of-state and international undergraduates earned a higher mean wage of \$17.50, with a median of \$16.00. Non-undergraduate students reported the highest wages overall, with a mean of \$20.90 and a median of \$17.00. Notably, all groups reported median and mean wages well above Indiana University's current minimum wage of \$10.15 per hour. This highlights a significant disparity between the university's wage standards and the broader job market, where even the lowest median wage (\$14.00 for in-state undergraduates) exceeds the university minimum by a considerable margin.

A programming error caused the values for on- and off-campus jobs to be automatically set to zero for respondents who did not engage with the question. Since individuals without jobs were less likely to interact with the question, many of their responses were not captured. Consequently, only the responses from those who reported having at least one job are reliable. All percentages are based solely on this subset, and the proportion of respondents without jobs cannot be determined.

The survey results indicate that 48.7% of students with a meal plan also purchased IU season tickets this year, compared to only 28.8% of students without a meal plan. Additionally, 47.4% of students who had IU season tickets also had a meal plan, whereas only 27.2% of students without IU season tickets had a meal plan. Because the incentive involved school spirit, survey respondents were likely more inclined to be IU season ticket holders.

The question was incorrectly programmed to accept a maximum value of only 50. Consequently, responses of 50 likely reflect averages that are significantly higher than this limit. These responses have been excluded from the calculation of the mean and median, as they are considered tuition-insensitive and not representative of the relevant population for this analysis.

The results from this question should be interpreted with caution and used only for the most general conclusions. The question presents a complex hypothetical scenario and includes an emotional incentive that may have biased respondents toward lower answers. While the question appears straightforward, it is more nuanced in practice. The most reliable takeaway is that approximately 55% of respondents show sensitivity to tuition increases, while 16% appear almost completely insensitive. Additionally, although transfer students are nationally more likely to transfer again, the data from this survey indicate no significant difference in the rates of considering dropping out or transferring between students who transferred to IU from another university and those who did not.

### Credits, Classes, and GPA

This question experienced a programming error during the first two hours of the survey's runtime, preventing responses from participants who completed the survey within that period. As a result, the responses to this question will only be used to sample populations by credit hour and should not be considered representative of the broader population. According to IU Institutional Analytics, the official average credit hour count per student is  $13.85^4$ , which falls outside the confidence interval of these survey results.

The "other" option allowed respondents to explain their reasons for not taking summer classes. Of the 49 respondents who provided explanations, most either reported taking summer classes (suggesting they may have misunderstood or incorrectly answered the previous question) or cited reasons already covered by the available options. Only two respondents indicated they did not take summer courses at IU because they preferred to take courses at other colleges during the summer.
